

FROM THE VICAR

Last month one of our Sundays fell on St Mary Magdalene's Day (most of the famous New Testament characters have a special day each year – hers is July 22nd). And so in our morning services we thought about her, and in particular her friendship with Jesus.

Fiction-writers down the centuries have made great play with their relationship – the Da Vinci code being just one of the most recent examples – suggesting that they were secretly married, for example. And certainly the Bible gives ample grounds for that sort of speculation, with their relationship being portrayed as one of evident closeness and affection.

In our monthly 'Lost in Translation' course, we looked a couple of months ago at one of the conversations between Jesus & Mary – in the garden on the first Easter morning. In the original Greek, while the Gospel-writer refers to her as '*Maria*', Jesus addresses her by the more personal Aramaic form of her name, '*Mariam*' – something only a brother or a father would normally do. (That's probably how she recognised him, which at first she failed to do.) Even more strikingly, Mary addresses Jesus by her pet-name for him – '*Rabbouni*' – a play on words from his more respectful title, Rabbi, meaning something like "my little Rabbi".

The probable truth is actually more interesting than the fiction-writers' idea that they had a romantic or even sexual affair. Those sorts of relationships were, as they still are, perfectly common!

Jesus was famous (notorious in his day!) for having relationships of openness with women – easy and natural contact, respectful and at times even playful – in a culture where such unselfconscious equality was seen as scandalous, and not something that a religious leader in particular would encourage. Jesus was different; and Paul (who summarised and developed the teaching of Jesus for the early church) spells out the implication: equality of the sexes ("in Christ there is neither male nor female..") and the radical reworking of conventional ways of relating ("From now on we regard no-one from a merely human point of view ..").

The friendship of Jesus and Mary is an early example of the open friendship, within and between the sexes – and indeed across class and racial divides too – that Jesus inaugurated. If they behaved, as they did, like brother and sister (puzzling and sometimes scandalizing those around them), it was because they shared a heavenly Father, whose love for them overflowed to each other and indeed to all around. An excellent pattern for our churches' life today.

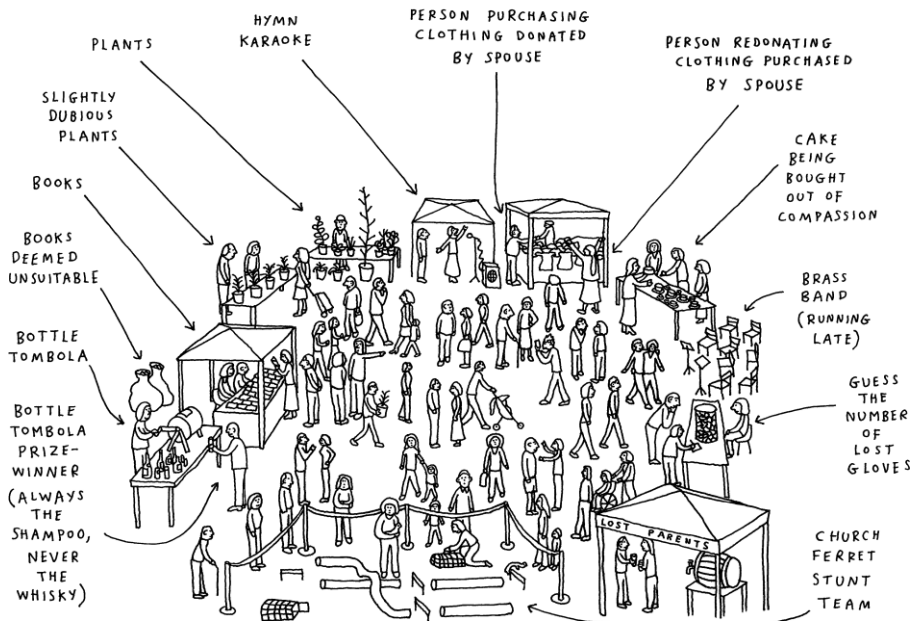

IMPORTANT NOTICE FOR DOG WALKERS

There is a serious crisis at Macaroni farm which began with two heifers aborting their calves prematurely and eight cows found to be without a live calf although previously confirmed as being in calf. This has meant that ten cows have had to be culled. These cows had been infected with **Neospora**. This is not only emotionally upsetting but has also had a big financial impact on the farm. Each of the organic calves which were lost would normally be sold at 18 months of age for £1,500 each, therefore this has resulted in a revenue shortfall of £15,000.



Neospora is a parasite transmitted to cattle by dogs that shed the parasite in their faeces. If dog faeces are left lying around in any field the grass can become infected with this parasite. When the cow eats this infected grass the infection passes through that cow to the unborn calf. Dog walkers need to be aware that dog poo lingers in the ground and vegetation, it is not effectively rotted down and washed into the ground. It only takes one mouthful of contaminated grass to quickly spread through the animal to then transmit from mother to offspring.

The message is a simple one: dog owners need to be responsible and pick up their dog poo.

Long may this summer last before autumn creeps in with its promise of conkers, falling leaves and pumpkins, bringing with it yet more outdoor activities to stimulate and interest everyone.
