

Hello from... ... Jon Gardiner

I was brought up in Down Ampney and then we moved to Poulton, where my mum still lives. Michelle is from Cirencester, and we've run The Keepers Arms in Quenington since 2007. It's a very different place to the one we walked into 13 years ago, and we're very proud of what has been achieved. The pub has four en-suite letting rooms, which are usually full from May through to October. In 2015 we took part in the Channel 4 programme Four in a Bed, and were delighted to be announced as the winners! The pub itself is a thriving drink and dine pub. We're fortunate to own the freehold, so we can source the beers and wines from wherever we like - we're careful to choose a good variety from a range of local and national producers.

When lockdown began it was a scary time: it was very difficult to lock the door and walk away from a business we'd worked so hard to establish. But we were determined to use the time constructively, and we (Michelle) decorated from top to bottom, we deep cleaned and we waited... while attempting to home school two boys aged 15 and 12. We started a takeaway service, which was well supported, but we didn't feel it was safe to continue once the seriousness of the virus became clear.

We reopened the bar on July 4th, followed by the kitchen on 24th. Just about all of our sittings have been fully booked since then, which has been incredibly encouraging. The rule now is a maximum table size of six people. To eat, you need to book online www.thekeepersarms.co.uk - our kitchen is open on Fridays 5.30 - 8.30pm, Saturdays 5.30 - 8.30pm and on Sundays 12-2.30pm.

We're determined to keep the pub safe, and, while you can pop in for a pint, you'll now need to sit down and have table service. As the pub is small, we feel we can keep it safe, and we won't let it get too busy!

Thank you to everyone who is continuing to support us. We're lucky to have so many great pubs locally: your support for us all is much appreciated - cheers!



CORONAVIRUS (COVID-19)

The main initial symptoms of coronavirus COVID-19 infection are:


- a high temperature you feel hot to touch on your chest or back (38°C or above)
- a new, continuous cough coughing a lot for more than an hour
- loss or change to your sense of smell or taste

Since the new school term began, there have been many more colds around. This can make people uncertain if they have a cold, flu or COVID-19. This chart may be helpful. If you have any of the COVID-19 symptoms you should get tested as soon



as possible to find out if you have coronavirus. You and anyone you live with (or in your support bubble) must self-isolate until you have been tested and received your result - or for at least 10 days BUT there has been a shortage of testing facilities. To get a test, fill in a form online or call 111 or 119 if you cannot use the internet.



MAXINE ROSE AND PIPPA THE GIANT PUFFBALL!

This sounds like the title of a fairy tale, so I'll hand you over to the story-teller!



Hello CHEQS community - I'm Max Rose. I moved to Southrop not long before lockdown, to a house needing many repairs. Sadly, I never got the chance to meet my community properly, partly as I had to self-isolate for many months. I'd lived in Oxford city centre for most of my life, so once I was free to mix again, I was keen to learn more about my green and beautiful surroundings - especially as I've been studying horticulture.

When one of my kind new neighbours picked and shared some field mushrooms with me, and explained what to look for myself, I was delighted! I'd previously done a 'fungus foray' course so was keen to get going. My clever mushroom-loving neighbour also told me about the delicious delights of a puffball! Then, whilst out walking a few days later with a friend, I spotted some white domes nestled in the long grass. It sent spores of excitement to my inner mushroom-loving side!

This was no ordinary mushroom! I would like to introduce you to Pippa Puff: a 3.6-kilogram puffball mushroom, with a 3-foot circumference - she had to be female (with curves to die for) and deserved a proper name!

Carrying this giant fungal specimen home attracted attention from curious passers-by: why was a woman in the middle of the village carrying a huge white object that looked as if it belonged in a science fiction movie? One tractor driver reversed his vehicle halfway up the road to

come back and photograph us. He told me it had made his day to see such an enormous mushroom - a delightful and novel experience for me, as a city person.

I knew I wanted to share Pippa when I picked her, and one

of the first people I made sure got a slice was the neighbour who told me about their existence. I then advertised Pippa on the Southrop Facebook page inviting people to try some, and was thrilled to meet a delightful chap who invited me to visit his garden. Another lady and her two children from the next village had travelled over specially



to try some of Pippa. The mum had brought me a jar of local honey to say thank you. I was so chuffed... such generosity. However, sadly, poor Pippa had now deflated from her puffy glory and fallen foul to yellowing of her snowy flesh and was deemed unsafe to eat - it had been hard to store her as she didn't fit in my fridge! The two children were disappointed and one asked if could I tell him where to find one of Pippa's siblings! I told them the location and, much to my delight and surprise, they returned 30 minutes later with a substantial puffball mushroom. It was wonderful to see the delight on the teenage boy's face! He and his family had returned to double check it was safe to eat. His sister was longing to know what it would feel like to touch and cut up its flesh. Delightful

questions! It feels like cutting a cross between a cake, polystyrene, and foam - in case you were wondering too! The mum then asked me if there was anybody else in the village who had missed out on a slice of my mushroom. I explained that yes, there was - a very kind lady who also lives in my village wanted some but couldn't have any because it had gone off. I later heard that the family had taken some of their mushroom to her. It was a wonderful coincidence, as this lady had helped me with my shopping during lockdown! Such kindness among strangers, how wonderful and how hopeful.

In total, approximately 17 people ate some of Pippa Puff - she led complete strangers to share mushrooms, bought several lovely new people to my door, and helped children to consider foraging safely with the family. This amazing fungus brought me

into a community I had missed out on, and gave me a wonderful memory and delicious meal so... Hip Hip Foray for Pippa Puff... and safe foraging to you in the abundant mushroom season!

SPOTLIGHT ON...

... Candy Cowan



Charles and I have lived in CHEQS for 5 years now, firstly in Hatherop and most recently in Quenington. We moved here just as we'd finished having all of our four children in quick succession - four in four years, with no twins!

On arriving here, we realised we had no childcare network to rely on, and finding a great babysitter or help for a school run when I needed to be in four places at once seemed much harder than it needed to be. So, we set up Kowalah - a mobile platform that connects busy parents with flexible childcare.

We now have hundreds of amazing Kowalahs (the ones who look after the little people!), all interviewed and reference checked - from Chipping Norton in the north, to Bristol and Bath in the south - and who support parents with anything from regular school runs or holiday help, to one off evenings out.

This year has been quite a year, as it has for most people. On 23rd March, business stopped overnight as no-one needed childcare - and the safety of our Kowalahs and families is paramount, so we stopped accepting any bookings. But since restrictions started easing in May, it has been wonderful to see the bookings flowing again - helping parents who are now working from home, and also providing valuable work to many of the Kowalahs who are now not attending university or have sadly lost other jobs because of COVID.

We invest a lot of time in the interviewing and referencing process for new Kowalahs, and our favourite messages from parents are when we hear how their children just adore the Kowalah who has picked them up from school that day and ask when can they come back. Most of our new families and Kowalahs come in through referrals which helps us to keep the quality of the service high for everyone.



We are always looking for new Kowalahs - they need to be over 18 with their own means of transport so if you have a son or daughter not heading to university this year then they can apply at https://www.kowalah.com/sitter-sign-up


