I've lived in Quenington with my family for 5 years now. Some of you may have seen me picking up litter

in and around the village since the start of the year. I'm doing this as the 'community service' element towards gaining the Duke of Edinburgh Bronze Award. I also have other elements to do: 'physical exercise' and 'advance in a skill' as part of the DOE, so I've taken up running and am continuing to learn the guitar - I'm now on Grade 6.

I have to do at least an hour a week of community service. The parish council is supporting me by lending me two litter-picker gadgets and hi-viz jackets. A member of my family comes out with me each week, to keep me company. We tend to go out on a weekend morning as it's no good trying to litter pick in the dark in the evening! I've split the village into sections and have been picking the litter up from a section a week, then I send a weekly report to the clerk of the parish council.

I was quite surprised by how much litter we've found. The first week covered The Green, the play park and Snakes Drive. We didn't find that much litter, except in the bus shelter and at the far end of the playground. However, the next two weeks - when I collected along Fairford Road and up to Donkeywell Farm - was a different story. The grass verges out of the village seemed to be packed with litter, particularly things that could be thrown out of car windows. We collected five large bin bags of rubbish from these areas. There were only two bags worth from Coneygar Road, down Fowler's Hill and along Victoria Road. The final section will be around the village and up Rag Hill. Then I'll start again.

So far, we've found 45 kg of litter in total. Included in this weight were: 83 plastic bottles; 14 glass bottles; 66 drinks cans. I've been shocked at the absurdity of some of our finds. We found a three-metre-long skirting board and an air pod holder, as well as three different boots! There are also so many car parts we may end up being able to build our own!

I wasn't sure how much I would enjoy this at the start, but actually it's fun. It's great being outside, even in the cold, and it's good to be doing something to help the village. So, the message this month is to take your litter home!



The new variants of the coronavirus are very transmissible, so keep at least 2 metres apart from anyone not in your household or bubble, wear a mask when people are around, and sanitise your hands after touching things when out.

FREE EXTRA SUPPORT DURING POWER CUTS

Scottish and Southern Electricity Networks (SSEN) recently contacted Quenington Parish Council to explain how they can help communities become more resilient in the event of a prolonged power cut.

SSEN has a **Priority Services Register** that residents who may need extra support during a power cut can sign up to. Those eligible to join the priority services are:

- Those dependent on electricity for medical home care
- Those who have a chronic illness or short-term medical condition eg recovering from a major operation
- Those who are disabled
- Those who have special communication needs eg blind, partially sighted, deaf or hard of hearing
- Those who have children under five years old
- Those who are over 60 years old

There is also a **PowerTrack App**, so anyone with a smart phone can log and track a power cut - not knowing how long a power outage will last is often a major cause of concern. The app is continually updated to advise of the estimated time of power restoration.

FREE EASTER MEALS AVAILABLE IN CHQ as a gift from the church



At Christmas time last year, the Gloucestershire Diocese organised an initiative called Comfort and Joy, in which over 3,000 Christmas dinners were paid for and distributed by church communities. The meals had been prepared by The Long Table, and were gratefully received by a host of different people. There is plan for a similar project this Easter, and the church in Coln, Hatherop & Quenington will be joining in. The meals are prepared, cooked and frozen by The Long Table, then distributed by members of the local church.

Gone (for now) are the community meals and gatherings, but instead The Long Table is supplying thousands of meals to people in their homes. And that is only one part of their work. WHAT A LOAD OF RUBBISH!

The problem of littering is one which never seems to go away. Young people are often blamed for dropping rubbish, but some youngsters are actively involved in making the



situation better. Heather Kent, a 12-year-old from Fairford, is a well-known campaigner and activist, who regularly collects bin bags full of litter from the streets in and around Fairford. She has been doing so since starting it as a Lent Challenge several years ago. She was recently a finalist in the Young Litter Hero 2021 awards of the Keep Britain Tidy Network. Fairford Town Council put Heather's name forward as she has done so much to improve the environment in and around the town.



There is action in our CHEQS villages too. As well as the great work Laura Garner is doing (see Hello From...), quite a few individuals in our villages regularly pick up litter as they walk the lanes and roads locally. Each village also has an annual Litter Pick (see below) organised by the parish

councils, and we are all encouraged to join in. Normally, it is a good way to get to know other people, but the required social distancing at the moment makes that a little more difficult. However, we can still chat to people on the other side of the road! Please be Covid-aware (the new variants are so much more transmissible) and use masks and sanitiser as appropriate.

ANNUAL CHEQS LITTER PICK

COLN ST ALDWYNS: Our annual socially distanced village litter pick around the parish will take place on **Saturday**, **20**th **March**. We will meet under the Chestnut tree by the Coln Stores at **9.30am**. Do come and join us, as our combined efforts make such a difference to the verges as you enter the village. **Please bring your own masks and gloves.** We will supply HiViz waistcoats, dustbin bags and litter grabbers.

PESACH

Merri Mayers, of Quenington, shares some thoughts about Pesach:

Passover, or Pesach, is a Jewish holiday celebrating the freeing of the Jews from their enslavement in ancient Egypt. "Passover" derives from the last of the ten plagues that G*d visited on the Egyptians as Pharaoh refused to release the Jews despite the requests of Moses. This last plague was the killing of the first born and the angel of death "passed over" the Jewish houses, sparing those inside. The Jews left Egypt in such a hurry, chased by Pharaoh, that their bread hadn't time to rise which is why we honour our freedom by eating, over the eight days of Pesach, matzoh (or unleavened bread). Several thousand Jews left Egypt and journeyed to Mount Sinai.



We celebrate with feasts called Seders on the first two days of Pesach, reciting the Haggadah - our liturgy describing our release from slavery and our flight from Egypt. It is a family and friends celebration and, perhaps, the one holiday for which one makes every effort to be home. I think this is because Pesach marks the beginning of a sense of "home", a journeying towards, and a coming together around it. I have very fond memories of Seders where all participated. The cooks would compare matzoh ball recipes with friendly competition around

whose were the fluffiest (top tip: add sparkling water to the mix!). All joyful and loving.

The deeper meaning to this holiday is one of hope. During the Seder we eat bitter herbs, remembering the bitterness of slavery and reminding us that we can work, as individuals, for all freedoms. Hope lives in our hearts, generation after generation. As the late Rabbi Sacks said: "It is the story of the defeat of probability by the force of possibility." In an increasingly uncertain, divided world, what better message to celebrate?


