

#### **COLN MILL DIARIES: #1 - WHAT NEXT FOR THE COLN MILL?**



Rob & Helen Forbes write: Given local interest in what will happen to the derelict Coln Mill (the traffic obstacle on the blind bend at the bottom of Coln!), we thought that people might appreciate regular progress updates in CHEQS magazine. After all, what better way to share with you the ebbs and flows of a challenging, yet rewarding (?!), mill restoration

project, that we hope will also deliver some long-term community benefits.

To be totally honest, we hadn't really expected to become owners of the Mill, but after an initial look we were blown away with the magic of the building and the potential to restore the water mill to working order. Once the grinding heart of the community, providing flour and bread for all, the Mill has been inactive since the 1960s and is now the crumbling home for a variety of birds and bats. Many of the parts and features, though covered in cobwebs, jackdaw nests and bat poo, are still intact and provide a fascinating insight into old engineering feats that our modern-day brains struggle to comprehend!

While the attached Millers cottage is suitable for residential renovation, we felt that it would be a huge waste for the Mill itself, with its characterful grain bays and shoots, grinding stones, cogs, pulleys and bread oven, to also be turned into a private dwelling. It remains to be seen exactly what can or can't be done, and there are certainly plenty of heritage, ecology and financial challenges ahead, but we hope to bring the magic of the Mill back to life and blend old fashioned grinding with modern day hydro power. We'll be exploring grants to assist with this and also hoping to provide spin-off commercial, community and educational opportunities. We hope to involve locals along the way and would welcome any input or ideas... Anyone for insect flour or a pint of Mill House IPA?

The spring term is always a busy one. The whole school participated in the Big Garden Birdwatch, and we were excited to spot 15 different types of birds - including a tiny wren, a green woodpecker and a great spotted woodpecker.

The School Council and Maths Coordinator organised another successful Number Day, raising funds for the NSPCC. We had some very inventive dressing upincluding a human die and a calculator! During the day we learnt maths through stories, played mathematical 'Who Wants to Be a Millionaire' and made gymnastic numbers. The afternoon was a frenzy of weighing, measuring and baking mug cakes. In addition, everyone got to take home a number biscuit. Wow – what a day!



To support our study of Judaism, the whole school had a Zoom call into Cheltenham Synagogue. Mrs Silverston told us how objects and the building are used, and explained the various festivals. It was a great opportunity for the children to connect their learning in class with real life.

Our pupils' health, safety, happiness and wellbeing are always our paramount concerns. Each year we invite Coram Life Education (the leading provider of relationships, health, wellbeing, and drugs education) to deliver sessions to all our year groups, to help the children make healthy choices. It's an opportunity to have fun, and learn at the same time. Some children caught up with Harold the Giraffe to

learn from him about sharing, others acted out the workings of the digestive system, and some took a trip to planet 'Conformatron', to learn about the value of diversity. Our first group of children have started their Beanology sessions, with Lizzie Skinner, which have kindly been funded by the Friends of Fairford and Lechlade Communities. In this group, art and craft activities are used to explore emotions and techniques for coping with feelings. So far, members of the group have made a 'worry box', and a fabulous light house - held up by the people, objects and mantras which support and make them each a shining light. Each week the children practise their mantras, and 'breathing in' their superhero!

We are also very grateful to have received a £1000 donation from the CHEQS and Local Villages Trust to spend on supporting the children's wellbeing. We are currently looking at how this can best be used to encourage a connection with nature and hands-on activities, which are so important for everyone's mental health.

This term we have enjoyed taking part in Outdoor Learning at Lea Wood with the Ernest Cook Trust. The year 4,5 and 6 children had an amazing morning in the woods. After their safety briefing, they were sent off in teams to create forest shelters. Every group demonstrated exceptional team-building skills and some wonderful structures were created.



The focus of Reception and Year 1's visit in the afternoon, was to explore the natural world around them and observe seasonal changes. They enjoyed taking part in a treasure hunt looking for signs of winter-including pinecones, skeleton leaves, sticks with lichen on and evergreen leaves. They finished their visit by finding good places for some cuddly hedgehogs to keep cosy in the winter.



Earlier in the month our school took part in the cross-county qualifiers and did incredibly well with six pupils qualifying to represent Cirencester District in the Gloucestershire Championships in March. #### STUART EMMERSON, MERRYFIELD FARM, COLN ST ALDWYNS (NEAR ALDSWORTH)

My family had farmed in Nottinghamshire for over 100 years, but our increasing numbers meant that the farm wasn't large

enough to support us all. My brother Anthony and myself started to look for two farms which were near enough to farm together. We sold our original farm in 1993, and it took over two years to buy somewhere (gazumping was a big problem in those days) and Swyre Farm was bought as much out of desperation as anything else! It was a good size, around 750 acres, but had no farmhouse - only two pairs of cottages which were three miles apart by road - one of which, extended and adapted, we live in today. The original farmhouse had been sold off years before, and was used at one time by the Beshara Trust, a spiritual group. Nearby farm buildings had been converted to dwellings. After a few planning pitfalls, permission was given for a new farmhouse, barns and storage, and eleven members of the family made the move to the Cotswolds: Anthony and myself, our wives, our mother and her six grandchildren.

In 2010, when the next generation were all adults, it seemed sensible to divide the farm into two, thus fulfilling the original plan. There were already a few buildings at the Aldsworth end of the farm so I added to these, and created a new farmstead. This was named Merryfield Farm because it was sited between two fields called



Merrybottom North and Merrybottom South. The origin of these names is unknown but it has been suggested that Merrybottom should be Mary's bottom field. Another explanation is that 'merry' is an old word for stream. The river Leach, in stream form, flows through the farm giving name to the field Leachbank. There is also a manmade lake which attracts various birds including many ducks.

When we arrived to farm the stony land, we were told that there had been quarries on the land for all sorts of stone, from building and walling stone to slating stone. One of the fields was called Slat Quarry Hill and this had very thin, flat stones. Much of the land had belonged to the Williamstrip Estate and some to the Hatherop Estate. In addition to the original farm, four fields were purchased later. They had a connection to the church and manor at Aldsworth, including reference in the deeds to Chancel Tax, a levy that could be imposed on property connected to parish land for the upkeep of the church - fortunately rarely collected! As there seemed to be no

knowledge of the names of these fields, we named them descriptively. One is called triangle for obvious reasons, one with a pool in it is Poolpiece, and a meadow which was used by a local resident, Bula Brazil, to home her horses and a visiting donkey, is known as Bula's Meadow. A sloping field is called Bulaslad as 'slad' means slope.

My father, grandfather and great grandfather - and probably previous generations - were farmers and I worked on the farm before and after leaving school. Having three sons, we thought at least one might want to farm. At one point this seemed unlikely as Edward, who had shown interest and obtained an agriculture degree, worked in finance for several years. Eventually, he decided to switch career to farming. Then the farm was mainly arable, but now we have over 400 sheep and up to 200 calves. The sheep are lambed in late February. Most of the lamb goes to supermarkets, but in 2020 we started selling lamb boxes to local residents. The calves come from dairy

farms across the country and are about four weeks old when they arrive. They are fed warm milk until they're weaned onto solid food. After three months, they go to new owners - though in recent years we have started to keep some to rear ourselves. They're fed on crops grown on our own land.



Our crops are wheat, barley, oats and beans.

The grain store holds 1000 tonnes of grain. Having a mixed farm is good for business diversity and helps in the balance of nature. The bales of straw produced are mostly used to bed down our cattle and then are spread back on the land as manure. Oilseed rape is no longer grown as it is no longer financially viable on poorer land, due to the banning of some herbicides and insecticides. Organic farming doesn't seem a desirable thing because the fall in production of food here is often met by countries who can ill afford to export crops. The great increase in wildlife we've seen on the farm leaves us unconvinced that modern farming is catastrophic to nature. Hares and skylarks abound, and the number of birds of prey has increased massively over the past few years. What is worrying is the number of diseases affecting trees. The farm had many elm tree stumps when we came, and now other varieties of trees are affected.



Farming life is not without its problems: security can be difficult because of the isolation, and times of drought or floods are very stressful. However, during the last two years of Covid, our farming has been relatively unaffected. The supply of calves was difficult when restaurants

were shut and milk not needed, as farmers kept their calves on cows to use up the milk. Although some people diversify into other business areas, there is nothing most farmers would rather do than farm.


