

Shena and I came to live in Coln St Aldwyns in 2000, to be near

her mother in Chedworth, and I have been involved in a variety of activities over the years. I have always loved the sound of church bells, so on coming to Coln, I decided to try my hand at ringing – St John the Baptist Church has a fine ring of eight bells. I was warmly welcomed by John Reeves and the small band of ringers, and began to learn under John's patient teaching. Once, I pulled the treble bell too hard and broke the safety stay - which pulled me up off the floor. Everyone shouted "let go", which I did. Luckily, the ceiling of the ringing chamber is high and I didn't hit my head! I never progressed very far, but when it goes well it is very satisfying - the nearest comparable thing I know is the satisfaction of rowing well in an eight.

In 2003, with the help of fellow Coln residents Ray Michael and Linda Bolter, I started 'Coln Cinema', raising money for local charities. We applied to join the CDC Rural Cinema scheme and started with *My Big Fat Greek Wedding*. CDC provided the equipment and a film once a month. It was hard work collecting and setting up the heavy equipment - which was not always reliable! We used the Reading Room at the Malt House for nine years, then Nigel Hugh-Smith offered us the use of his fully equipped barn, and we could become independent of CDC - audience numbers also noticeably increased. I retired from Coln Cinema in 2019 and I am glad it is being carried on so well by Nick Brett.

My CHEQS Mailing list developed out of Coln Cinema. I was walking round the village pushing flyers through letter boxes when I realised I had email addresses for all these houses, so I sent the flyers by email. Much easier, and it now has 515 addresses!

Neighbourhood Watch was another occupation. Jean Sinton, the then chairman of the Parish Council, told me I had 'been chosen' to represent Coln. No option! I learnt a lot about the parish, and the Gloucestershire police - their relationship with NW has much improved in recent years.

Another interest was the Gloucestershire Historic Churches Trust. A very worthwhile charity supporting our lovely ancient churches; they gave a substantial grant to Coln church. The annual Ride and Stride takes place each September, and the cycling is the easy part - the hard work is raising the sponsorship. I enjoyed the cycling, but never got round more than about 10 churches. However, one year I managed to win the Holmes Salver for the person aged over 70 raising the most money. The salver was presented by Diana Holmes in memory of her husband, Francis. He was nearly blind but could follow her, brightly dressed, on a bicycle in the Historic Churches Ride and Stride when he was still in his 80's.



- Building a cycle training park

- Developing safer cycle routes (with town & district councils) in Faringdon


The CHQ Messy Church

Clare Brignall writes: If you add the area of all the churchyards in the country together, they make up roughly the size of the Isle of Wight - and they're mostly land which hasn't been cultivated and therefore full of wildlife habitats. It's great to use these spaces to encourage diversity of plants and insects. Some of you will have noticed the beautiful long grass in our churchyards as part of No-Mow May. This was part of our Eco Church programme. Eco Church aims to help us make our churches more environmentally friendly in five core areas: worship, buildings, land, community/global concern and our own lifestyle. As part of the worship element, we had an Eco Sunday service at which we reminded ourselves of God's amazing creation and our part in sustaining it. We did this through worship, prayer, a talk, and some practical activities, including making bug hotels!



There's a bug village in Hatherop churchyard, which has been added to with the help of the primary school children at the 'Churches Count on Nature' day, where we investigated the flora and fauna in our churchyards. There's still more to be done, and it's a project which can include the whole community - in our lifestyle choices and our



commitment to the plants and insects in our beautiful villages: it's a very long-term project. Targets which will enable us to gain a silver award are connected with our carbon footprint, our use of water and other resources, using more Fairtrade products, working with other environmental groups... and so much more. An exciting and challenging time ahead!



Eco-tip for this month is: to be aware of our use of water - in toilets, showers, baths, gardens - see if we can cut down on both use and waste.



JAMES HART, GLEBE FARM, HATHEROP

When I came to Glebe Farm in 1969, aged 3, with my mother, father (the new tenant), and sisters, the farm looked very different. Cart horses had only just been removed from the Nag Stables, the four staff

were paid a few pounds a week, and the wheat yielded about $1\frac{1}{2}$ tonnes/acre. The last 50 years have been full of change; sizeable cattle- and pig enterprises have come and gone, yields are now $3\frac{1}{2}$ tonnes/acre, but overhead costs are up 10-fold. Wheat prices have only slowly increased until recently, but are now unusually high due to the war in Ukraine and poor harvests in North and South America, due to drought.

My father's aim at the start was to create a profitable business that could afford to look after the staff, animals and the environment. To achieve that, he needed to increase the income from the farm - at the start only 550 acres. He started a pig business, and rented another small area of land at Homeleaze Farm. Over the next eight years he built two pig units, and by 1977 there were another eight families living off 800 acres... and Fraser Hart was the official Meat & Livestock Commission national "Pig Farmer of the Year"!

When my wife and I succeeded the tenancy, in 1999, the pig units were old and in need of massive reinvestment - at a time of falling pig prices, increasing welfare regulations, and a drive to produce cheap meat. We needed to grow the business again so, two years later, we joined forces with our neighbouring Ernest Cook Trust tenants, Bob and Jeremy Iles, giving



us greater economy of scale, and freedom to pursue other areas of farm business.

In 2009 we were selling pigs and wheat for nearly the same price as my father had been in the 1980's so, a few years later, we made the difficult decision to revert to purely arable farming at Glebe Farm, along with the investment we had made in an Anaerobic Digestion plant. An AD plant uses a carefully balanced mix of organic matter and methane-producing bacteria to generate renewable electricity - we have now injected over 31 million kW into the local grid. As a joint business, the AD plant allows us to keep more livestock and have a wider crop rotation. We also use less artificial fertiliser, as the digestate by-product is used to fertilise the soil. Now, after years of using animal manures and the natural digestate fertiliser from our AD plant, our soils are much healthier - the occasional smells have been worthwhile! As well as enabling us to farm more ecologically, the AD plant provides an income source, more employment and, we are told, a much more stable electricity grid for local users – a win-win for all.

Government input over this time has been good and bad in equal measure, at times pushing us in directions that we wouldn't always favour but which, financially, we cannot ignore. The historic drive to reduce costs and/or increase production in farming is the same as in any business, but it does put pressure on wildlife. However, new government policy is, frighteningly, based on turning our land into a large garden, with no mention of food production anywhere. At the same time, consumers have become ever more detached. Supermarkets provide so much choice and "value" (i.e. cheap food). Sadly, survival when supplying a supermarket means producing more cheaply, regardless of the effects on your community and its habitat.

My father was, and remains, a passionate - and much sought-after - local source of knowledge and experience on matters of flora and fauna. His countless hours of work and investment have reaped rewards: on two short walks last year through a standard arable area of the farm, we counted 11 different butterflies and moths including Meadow Brown, Speckled Wood, Gatekeeper, Dark Green Fritillary, Chalkhill Blue and Six-spot Burnet moth, as well as birds including White Throat, Wheatear, Green Sand Piper and Linnet. Brown hare numbers have also rebounded.

Our current aim includes adopting Regenerative Farming techniques across all areas of the farms - ensuring soil health, conserving water, increasing biodiversity etc. We aim to actively support wildlife on our poorer land, while attempting to make a profit on the land that is suitable for cropping. We've reduced the use of insecticides over recent years to absolute necessity levels, and many fields have been free of insecticides for some time now. The products we spray are vastly safer than 30 years ago, and increasingly, we are spraying only natural products; trace elements such as copper, boron, silicon, manganese, phosphorus and many others, all timed to help the plants fight disease and pests, hopefully negating the need for follow-up pesticide use. These trace elements still cost, and require spraying onto the plants, but the soil and plant health should benefit from this change. It is not "organic" but we believe that we can produce high levels of more nutritious food and still farm in an environmentally aware manner. Currently, there is no market for this "nutritionally better" food - the supermarkets cannot sell it cheaply, so they are not interested... vet! The new trade agreement signed with Australia (a country that can produce food more cheaply, but with far lower welfare standards) shows how we remain pressured to produce more food, at a lower cost.

In 2020 Jeremy and I merged our joint arable farming business with the Backhouse family at South Farm, to create a business of around 1,200 hectares. Our goal is to become carbon neutral, which will take some time to achieve. You may notice some changes: more sheep and cattle on our farms on cover crops over the winter, where we are planning a spring crop, and a greater mix of crop types. At times, it may look scruffier, but the soil and wildlife should thrive. Our 25-year-old son, currently serving in the Parachute Regiment, plans to return to the farm one day. Hopefully, he too will be lucky enough to raise a family at Glebe Farm, and the land will generate profits that enable it to flourish, both financially and environmentally, over the next 50 years.
