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Hello from... Simon Brignall



On 7th August, the CHQ Parish will be holding a LOAF service. You may wonder what that's all about! So, here's an explanation.

Down the centuries, some churches have celebrated an ancient service called Lammas, on the first Sunday in August. The service is first recorded in the time of King Alfred and the word is thought to be derived from the early English word for 'loaf' - so the translation would be Loaf Mass. It was a festival in the church calendar to thank God for, and to bless, the 'first fruits' of harvest, with a loaf of bread being brought to the church for this purpose. The loaf was traditionally made from the grain of the first crop of wheat being harvested that year.



Today, many churches use the festival to celebrate their local farming community. The organisation Green Christian delevoped an acronym for LOAF, which ties farming and ecology together:

L for **Local**, O for **Organic**, A for **Animal-friendly**, and F for **Fairtrade**.

Farming methods change and evolve over the years, as we have seen in the Focus on Farms feature in the magazine this year. It is good to know how our farmers are producing the food we eat, in these challenging times.

Last year, we invited Laura and Matt Elliot, who produce pasture fed beef, to

tell us about how they farm their beef herd. This year, we have invited Tim Morris to tell us about arable farming in the Cotswolds. We do hope that you'll come and enjoy this celebration of our local farming community.

Interestingly, Fussy is at the top of the list of

NEWS FROM THE CIRENCESTER DEANERY

The Cirencester Deanery have drafted a plan in response to financial problems, and a projected decline in the number of clergy in the coming years. FREEDOM SUNDAY IN THE CHQ CHURCHES

Freedom Sunday will be celebrated in the CHQ churches on Sunday, 25th September, and the work the International Justice Mission (IJM) will feature in the services. Everyone is welcome to come and learn more about this important work.

International Justice Mission (IJM) is a global organisation working to protect people from slavery and violence. IJM's European Anti-Trafficking Programme has been working on cross-border trafficking in Europe, based out of Romania, for the last two years. In partnership with police, IJM helps to bring people who have been trafficked for labour or sexual exploitation to safety, supports survivors as they heal, helps bring traffickers to justice, and works to prevent trafficking. The following is just one person's story about how the IJM has helped changed their life:

While fleeing the conflict in Ukraine, Larysa (not her real name) was robbed, and abandoned at the Romanian border by a man who had approached her and promised to take her to safety. She was picked up and cared for by an IJM-trained local shelter, who helped to arrange a safe - and vetted - onward journey to Nuremburg in Germany, where she wanted to go. But part way through her journey, Larysa was contacted by another man, online. He convinced her to get on a bus to Berlin instead, with the promise of a job – a method we know is commonly used by traffickers.

Thankfully, the shelter team remained in close contact with Larysa, and became aware of this man's suspicious behaviour. They quickly warned her that the job offer could be exploitative and, with their support and advice, she got off the bus to Berlin. Larysa continued her journey by train to Nuremburg, where a trusted partner NGO picked her up. Now she is safe.


CHARLES MANN, OXLEAZE FARM, FILKINS & BRADBOROUGH FARM, SOUTHROP

The history of life on this part of the Gloucestershire and Oxfordshire borders goes back a long way. Metal detectorists have come up

with all sorts of ancient relics – a bronze-age axe head and an incredibly sharp spear head in almost perfect condition, a Roman soldier's frying pan (now in the Corinium Museum), bits of 2,000-year-old pottery and floor mosaic, and coins - from Roman denarii through to silver coins from the Jacobean kings. Going back even further, we regularly unearth fossils of cockle shells from a time when the whole area was submerged under the warm shallow waters of the Rheic Ocean during the Cambrian period, 485 million years ago!

The Romans established a farm on the banks of the River Leach and we have the remains of a Roman villa on the farm. It is a scheduled monument, but sadly now only a mere hump in the field. There are ancient field workings known as 'ridge and furrow' creating patterns across many of our fields – and which can be seen in the fields on the left when you arrive at the farmstead. These were made in Saxon times and are a sign of good grazing land.

Moving on a few hundred years, the Cotswolds became a vastly wealthy farming economy based on the 'Golden Fleece'. Huge flocks of sheep (originally brought over by the Romans) grazed the landscape and provided the local mills with high quality wool that was transformed into the finest cloths and exported across Europe. The meat, then mutton, was only a by-product. The red serge of the soldiers of the Empire, and the green baize of the snooker tables all came from the Cotswold mills.



Farming in England hit rock bottom during the Depression, Agricultural 1875 to the Second World War. This was caused by the ability to import cheap grain and frozen meat from the colonies. During this time much of the land was left untended and here at Oxleaze Farm the only 'harvest' was the long-netting of coneys, the local name for rabbits.



As a family, we started farming here in 1949 when my father, Jock Mann, bought 400 acres and farmed traditionally, with oats and hay grown for 'fuel' for the horses that were even then working on the farm, as well as growing wheat, and rearing pigs, sheep and cattle. In those days the water was spring-fed and pumped to the farm with a 'ram' pump which has to be the most eco-pump ever

invented. This has now been superseded by a more reliable source of pure water via a bore hole. I can remember feeding cattle in the winter months with horse and cart loaded with turnips or mangolds. We had what was termed a 'house' cow for milk and butter for the farmhouse and cottages – it was great fun learning to milk her and getting frothing fresh milk to drink, with rich full fat creamy milk for our corn flakes – delicious.

My father died following a fall from his horse while out hunting in 1978. Chipps (my wife) and I then took on the farming. This was the era of the 'green revolution' - in hindsight, a ridiculously ill-chosen term for our management of the land and well before the meaning of 'green' as we know it today. However, we knew no better and both the Government and consumers demanded cheap food which is what we, as farmers, were proud to produce. We enthusiastically sprinkled on the nitrogen, phosphates and potash, liberally sprinkled with the condiments of chemicals to enable even our stony Cotswold brash soils to produce valuable quantities of wheat, barley and oilseed rape. At this time livestock became too costly to manage with rising wages, so monocultures of crops became common practice across the lowlands of England. It was in the mid-90s that we began to comprehend the damage that we had been doing to the biodiversity of the environment. The government



introduced funding for some conservation measures to address this, but the EU strategy had produced the mountains of wheat, the frozen stores of butter, the lakes of wine and the heaps of dried milk powder; a horrific embarrassment to all. The bureaucrat's immediate answer to this was the introduction of set-a-side, an equally manic policy but in the reverse direction, paying farmers to do absolutely nothing with their land! Politicians!

Progressively we increased our involvement with conservation measures, working with the likes of the Wildlife Trusts and Farming and Wildlife Advisory Group (FWAG) as well as Natural England, to begin to rebuild our connection with nature. Now, as fully organic members of the Countryside Stewardship Higher Tier programme and also Phase 1 Pilots for the new, post-Brexit Environmental Land Management Scheme, we are seeing a fantastic revival of so much: from Barn Owls and fallow deer to massive numbers of voles, field mice, worms, and all the little bugs that are



the foundation for the biodiversity that makes England's countryside so spectacular. The farm has finally come alive once again! What we are doing to make a difference:

- Our Aberdeen Angus Cattle are 100% pasture-fed (on herbal-rich leys and grasses rich in chicory and sainfoin), slowly and extensively reared to enhance the healthy eating experience, rich in Omega 3.
- 35 acres of species-rich semi-natural grasslands (equivalent to 17 football pitches)
- A long-term project for carbon sequestration. We have planted 30,000 new trees, and 26,000 hedging plants
- Oxleaze Farm holds membership and accreditation with the leading associations for organic farming and conservation to ensure welfare of our animals
- All heating and hot water for the farm comes from our biomass boiler, with locally sourced wood chip (50% from our own woodland). Solar panels supply green electricity to 24 commercial and residential properties on the farm.
- Hedgerows, shrubbery and wild bird mix for birds, butterflies, bees, bugs and insects to live in and survive from
- Expanses of woodland for cricket bat willows, firewood and woodchip
- Barns converted into eleven workshop units
- Converted C18th threshing barn for weddings, parties and even funerals!
- A maturing Cotswold Garden, open to visitors by arrangement
- Three colonies of bees producing honey from the organic meadows

Three miles from Oxleaze Farm, we have another 450 acres of land in Southrop which is used for further grazing for cattle, and light industrial units for businesses.



Bradborough Farm is a hive of wildlife activity with 14 hectares of wild bird mixture, and a further 60 hectares of plants that provide pollen and nectar to pollinators such as bees and butterflies. There is a key focus on conservation here. Bradborough is home to many families of lapwings, which nest and rear their young in the middle of fields, thanks to the planting strategy which is perfect for their habitat. We plan to increase planting woodland to continue our project of carbon sequestration. Our tree planting in 2017 has seen an increase in birds, insects, voles and rabbits providing habitats and food as well as improving our carbon efficiency.





We are now farming as a family partnership with our three children all actively involved: Katie overseeing the Oxleaze Barn venue – www.oxleaze.co.uk; Will with the cattle, and conservation; and Jo taking a less hands-on role, with her own lighting business based in an office on the farm - www.light-housedesigns.com

Nearing retirement and preparing to hand on the baton to the next generation, we have seen a full circle of agriculture. With bird and butterfly species increasing year on year, and an entire underclass of bugs and beetles on the march, we definitely know which kind of stewardship we like the best.
