Owning a bookshop presents its own time challenges, sometimes working seven days a week, days and nights, but bookshops are magical places: time machines, spaceships, travel portals, and safe places to be still and relax. Every day I put the key in the door, I am reminded of that.



Bookshops are not only a local business; they are a much-needed community space - not to be replaced by screens and clicks. September sees our second Literary Festival so, with authors from Pam Ayres and Alison Weir to our Secret Garden Party and Poetry in the Priory, life is even more hectic than usual - but there is always time for books, be it a rushed few pages over breakfast, or a chapter before sleep. I do hope you'll find time to come and sit a while in the Madhatter Bookshop, join us at Burford Literary Festival, or raise a glass or two of 'shelf medication' at our regular BookBar evenings we look forward welcoming to you.

Come and join friends and neighbours for the coffee morning. There is no charge for refreshments, but you could make a small donation to the charity being supported this month, which is the eye charity, **Orbis**.



Orbis is an international charity working to make eye care available everywhere, for everyone, so that noone has to suffer the consequences of avoidable blindness. The charity, which works in some of the world's poorest countries, is the result of an unusual alliance between some

leaders of the medical and aviation industries in the 1970s. Project Orbis was launched in 1973 to deliver training in eye treatment and care to doctors and nurses all over the world. The name *Orbis* derived from the word's meanings in two different languages: in Latin "of the eye" and in Greek "around the world." The work grew to include a flying eye hospital and hospital-based training programmes and video teaching. In 2021, Orbis trained almost 17,000 eye health professionals from 184 countries and regions, and the videos in their library received over four million views. That translates into a lot of blindness prevented, giving the ability not only to earn a living, but also to enjoy a better quality of life, to many people around the world.

FAIRFORD & DISTRICT MEN'S SHED

In many parts of the country, there are places where men can meet, to engage in practical work, and the development or sharing of skills – and, at the same time, support each other in whatever way they might need.

The Men's Sheds Association's website explains the need:

"Research has shown the negative impact of loneliness and isolation on a person's health and wellbeing. Recently, we have seen more evidence come to light that shows loneliness and isolation can be as hazardous to our health as obesity and excessive smoking. Surveys from mental health charities are finding that millions of people report feeling lonely on a daily basis.

"Men typically find it more difficult to build social connections than women, and unlike women of a similar age, fewer older men have networks of friends, and rarely share personal concerns about health and personal worries."

The Association says that groups can, "...reduce isolation and feelings of loneliness, they allow men to deal with mental health challenges more easily and remain independent, they rebuild communities and, in many cases, they save men's lives."

Fairford now has its own Men's Shed, which was officially opened last month by Victoria Edwards, Chief Executive of The Ernest Cook Trust, with more than 40 people in attendance.

During the early days of Working for Wellbeing, the need for a men's meeting place in the area was recognised. Conversations took place between Mary Ann Dibbs, W4W Coordinator, and various local people - including Malcolm Cutler,



now chairman of the Fairford & District Men's Shed.

The Ernest Cook Trust was approached to see if there was a suitable property which could be made available. The dovecote and annexe, which is being let to the Men's Shed group at a concessionary rent, is thought to date back to the 16th century. Fairford History Society is piecing together the history of the building. Originally, the annexe next to the dovecote was a carpenter's workshop, but it has also been used over the years as a barn, a studio and, more recently, as a storage area for various organisations... There was a lot of hard work to do before the space could be used!





Many local people and groups have been involved in clearing out the space, cleaning and preparing it, and then equipping it with the necessary tools. In addition to The Ernest Cook Trust, groups such as the Lechlade & District Lions Club and the Friends of Fairford & Lechlade Communities have given time, energy and money - in addition to the many local people who have also helped in very practical ways.



The Fairford & District Men's Shed is a community space for members - who are welcomed not only from Fairford, but also Lechlade and the surrounding villages – where they can meet up, pursue practical interests and hobbies, or just chat over a cup of tea or coffee. Any men who would like to see what goes on in the Fairford Men's Shed can go along on a Wednesday,

between 9.30am and 12.30pm. The dovecote is rather tucked away, but the entrance to the lane is found opposite the gates of Fairford Cricket Club, in Park Street.




Libby Roberts, of Southrop, is starting off the new CHEQS Magazine occasional feature with three examples of what could be included in this slot:

Eco-tip for this month is: Composting!

If you can fit a compost bin in your garden, you can use it for your kitchen fruit and veg waste, grass cuttings etc. Not only will you end up with some soil-improving compost, but you'll also be reducing your need for kerbside food waste collections. This will cut down on the number of trips for the collection lorries, saving costs for the council, and producing fewer greenhouse gases, a cause of global warming. A great way to celebrate Great Big Green Week – 24th September to 2nd October!



Gloucestershire County Council recommends looking at *getcomposting.com* for some reasonably-priced bins.

Where to put your bin: The micro-organisms that convert the waste to compost don't like extremes of temperature, so put it in the shade or partial shade. An earth base allows drainage and access to soil organisms. A cover or lid should keep the rain out, but also allow air to circulate.

What to put in your compost bin: A good mix of 'green' and 'brown' material. **Green:** teabags (with no plastic content), grass cuttings, vegetable peelings, salad leaves, fruit scraps, coffee grounds, old flowers, nettles and old

bedding plants. **Brown:** crushed egg shells, cardboard egg boxes, toilet and kitchen roll tubes, thin garden prunings and hedge clippings, straw and hay, bedding from *vegetarian* pets, ashes from wood, sawdust, wood chippings, wool, tissues. Don't have too much of one thing, especially grass clippings - they can become slimy.

What NOT to include: Never put in meat or dairy products, diseased plants, perennial weeds or weeds with seed heads, dog poo or cat litter!

Turning the heap: Turning the heap adds air, which is necessary for composting to occur. If the heap is too wet or compacted, composting will be slower.

Compost can take from six months to two years to be ready for use. Mature compost will be dark brown, with a crumbly soil-like texture and a smell like damp woodland. If it has twigs and eggshells in it, just sift them out and return them to your compost bin. Your compost will be nutrient-rich and will help improve soil structure and maintain moisture levels... and your plants will love it!

UPDATE FROM THE CIRENCESTER DEANERY

The Cirencester Deanery has drafted a plan in response to its financial problems. Within the plan there is a proposal for Coln St Aldwyns, Hatherop and Quenington to lose its minister post and merge with the Bibury Benefice.



THE ERNEST COOK TRUST

The Ernest Cook Trust was established, as an educational charity 70 years ago, and therefore shares a Platinum Jubilee with Her Majesty the Queen.

Who was Ernest Cook?

middle son of John Mason Cook and Emma (née Hodges). He also happened to be one of the grandsons of Thomas Cook, the travel entrepreneur.

Born in September 1865, in Camberwell, London, Ernest was educated at Mill Hill School, just outside London, as were his two brothers, Frank and Thomas. The school was set up in 1807 by merchants and ministers from Christian nonconformist backgrounds in order to provide a place of learning for the boys from their communities: most other public schools required their pupils to belong to the Church of England. As non-conformists, those shaping the original curriculum for the school sought to provide a more radical and modern approach to learning than was available at the time.



Ernest entered the family travel business and helped develop its banking operations. On his father's death in 1899, Ernest and his brothers were bequeathed the business. However, the youngest brother, Thomas, left the running of it to his older brothers, and went to Norfolk to develop his country house, Sennowe Park. Thomas died in 1914, and on Ernest's retirement in 1928, he and Frank sold the business.

After retiring to Bath, Ernest devoted himself to his art collection and the acquisition of country estates. He accumulated a large amount of fine and decorative art, which came to be the largest bequest ever left to the National Art Collections Fund. In 1931, Ernest acquired Montacute House in Somerset, and the Bath Assembly Rooms, for the Society for the Protection of Ancient Buildings (founded by William Morris). Ernest Cook also became a major benefactor of the National Trust and encouraged



the Trust to acquire historic country houses and estates: Montacute House and the Assembly Rooms were transferred to the National Trust. Ernest Cook went on to acquire a total of seventeen estates, and in 1952, he established the educational charitable trust which bears his name. Between 1952 and 1961, seven of his remaining country estates came into the ownership of the Trust: Boarstall and

Hartwell Estates, and Penn Woods in Buckinghamshire; Fairford Estate in Gloucestershire; Little Dalby Estate in Leicestershire (1952); Slimbridge Estate in Gloucestershire (1953); and Trent Estate in Dorset (1961). And in more recent years, Hatherop Estate 2002 and Filkins Estate in 2007, amongst others. Ernest Cook died just three years after setting up the Trust, but he left a legacy which lives on today.

What does The Ernest Cook Trust do?

It is one of the UK's foremost providers and funders of Outdoor Learning, providing for children, young people, their families and communities - both on its own land, and with partner estates. Every year, it also gives out thousands of pounds in grants to enable outdoor learning. The Ernest Cook Trust remains deeply rooted in its founder's love of the countryside, owning more than 23,000 acres of land across six English counties from Cumbria to Dorset.

There are various strands to the work of the Trust:



Everything Outdoors encourages schools and other communities to enable people to experience life on the land, and to learn skills appropriate to that environment.

Green Influencers Scheme enables people to be educated, encouraged and empowered to raise awareness of the risks to our planet and health - including climate change, over-use of resources, reduction of biodiversity, and pollution. Green influencers also help people take positive action in the fight against these dangers.

The OWL Collaboration is a 4-year programme, bringing together Outdoor Learning Centres, schools and funders to help 4,400 disadvantaged children to have an **O**utdoor **W**eek of Learning.

The Learning Estate: In its role as landowners and influencers in the debate around the environment, farming and sustainability, the Trust is pursuing a bold, collaborative project on the Little Dalby estate in Leicestershire. It aims to develop lasting, sustainable outcomes for the landscape and its communities. Set against a backdrop of environmental, economic, social and health challenges, this 10-year project aims to become a beacon for the future of estate management.

Emergency pandemic provision

In the early stages of the pandemic, from April to June 2020, the Trust redirected £117,500 of grant funds to schools to support their most disadvantaged pupils. The grant provided essential education material, tablets, laptops and broadband provision to 41 schools. In some circumstances, the funds were also used by schools to provide food parcels. Home-schooling proved extremely challenging for parents, especially when children were sharing devices or had no equipment at all, so in January to February 2021 and in response to this widening gap in remote learning access across the UK, a further £504,350 provided 211 schools nationwide with an estimated total of 2,780 devices.

A new venture

In September 2021 the Trust bought Low Beckside Farm, Mungrisdale, Cumbria. This upland farm previously belonged to an agricultural college. The Trust acquired the farm with the intention of keeping land-based skills training within Cumbria. This is a milestone in the Trust's seventy year history – the Trust becoming farmers! The first step will be to conduct a study of the land-based learning needs of the area, and evaluate appropriate farming systems to improve the environmental quality of the farm. The work here will come under the Everything Ourdoors programme area.

Local connections

CHEQS Farms

Many of the farms in and around our CHEQS communities are owned by The Ernest Cook Trust, and leased to tenant farmers – sometimes for several generations:

- Glebe Farm, Hatherop (Hatherop Estate)
- Homeleaze Farm, Hatherop Downs (Fairford Estate)

Fairford Park

The core of the Fairford Park Estate was purchased by Ernest Cook in 1945 from the Barker family. Fairford Park House had been used as an American field hospital during the war but the cost of restoring the house to its former condition was considered by Ernest Cook and his agent to be financially prohibitive. The house, along with some adjoining land, was sold to Gloucestershire County Council, and the house demolished in the mid-1950s, in preparation for the building of Farmor's School and Fairford C/E Primary School. During the post-war period, part of the park was occupied by displaced Polish people until the camp closed in 1959.

The Trust purchased further land: in 1966 (Court Farm); 1967 (Hooks Farm at Southrop Airfield); 1975 (Homeleaze Farm); and in 1982 (Donkeywell Farm). The town of Fairford is central to the main estates owned by the Trust in the area, and its Head Office is located in the former stable and coach house yard at Fairford Park.



Court Farm, Quenington

The Ernest Cook Trust acquired much of the land around Court Farm in 1966. In 2021, the Trust was given the significant gift of Court Farm in Quenington. Court Farm comprises a modern architect-designed house; the historic Grade 1 listed Knights Gate House; three modern detached cottages; a magnificent Cotswold Barn; and approximately 50 acres of pasture land (which is contiguous with other land owned by the Trust). Chairman, Andrew Christie-Miller, wrote, "We are enormously grateful to The Frank Gollins Charitable Trust, the late Beryl Gollins, David and Joanna Gollins for entrusting us with this wonderful property. In addition there is also a collection of paintings by Ormond Edwin Gollins. In accordance with their wishes these will be displayed and we will also be running a bi-annual art competition for local schools."

Home Farm, Netherton

Last year, the Trust took back the responsibility for Home Farm, Quenington. The organic livestock and arable farm had been farmed by the Lander family for over a hundred years. Tim Lander made the difficult decision to hand the farm back to the Trust shortly before he passed away. The longterm intention is to use the pasture land as another learning enterprise. The Trust is aware that there is a lot of work to do to develop a suitable programme, but it is hoped that, in time, something very special will be created at Home Farm, which will do justice to the memory of Tim Lander.

Ukrainian families

The Ernest Cook Trust generously donated the rent-free lease of a large residential property in the heart of Fairford, for use by two Ukranian families escaping the ravages of their war-torn country. Local residents and businesses donated items and help to equip the house, ready to welcome the families.
