

## SOUTHROP ROAD CLOSURE FOR RESURFACING

Gloucestershire County Council Highways have a Temporary Traffic Order to close the road for carriageway resurfacing in Southrop, for approximately six days (not counting weekends) between the hours of 9.30am and 3pm.



The PLANNED start and end dates 28<sup>th</sup> are currently Monday. November to Monday, 5<sup>th</sup> December. However, keep an eye on the web page detailed below, or the signs on site, for any short notice changes. The resurfacing programme can be affected by things like heavy rain, changes in temperatures and other weather events. as well as unforeseen technical issues that arise once work has begun, so scheme dates and details can change at short notice. All are welcome to come to the coffee morning, to enjoy chat, and FREE home-made cakes and a hot drink. There will also be an opportunity to donate to the work of CHYP (Cirencester Housing for Young People).

Established in 1986, CHYP provides 24-hour supported accommodation for young, homeless people between the ages of 16 and 25 in the Cotswold District area. They aim not only to offer these young people a roof over their heads, but also the practical and emotional support they need. The young people are taught how to look after themselves, and helped to gain confidence and live a more fulfilling, independent life.

Residents come from a variety of backgrounds. Most have been made homeless as a result of family break up, abuse or leaving local authority care. Many have additional problems such as learning difficulties or mental health issues. Each resident has a dedicated key worker who works closely with them to identify their support needs. With support available 24-7, the main house provides a high level of help.

During their stay, residents will start preparing for life in their own home. Help is given with life skills from self-care, cooking and laundry, to literacy, numeracy and budgeting. Their key worker is also there to provide crucial emotional support.

As residents become more confident and their skills grow, they are moved to the 'moving-on' house, which accommodates four people. Here, the level of support is lower, as the residents are encouraged to learn to become more independent. The key workers work with residents to locate appropriate further education, work experience, or training placements – hopefully all leading to employment and eventually independent living. At this point CHYP continues to support residents and will go on being there for them whenever they need help.

All of CHYP's residents are economically, emotionally or educationally disadvantaged and have suffered from complicated challenges in their lives. No young person is homeless without something going seriously wrong in their life at some point. Each young person has their own unique set of problems requiring individual attention. Most importantly, they need somebody they can trust and rely on, often for the first time in their lives, which is where CHYP comes in. Every young person deserves a chance.

#### Beccy's Story (not real name)

At the age of 23, Beccy was forced to move back to her parents' home following a relationship breakdown. She suffered from bipolar disorder and her relationship with her family became very strained as she found it impossible to fit back in. She was accepted by CHYP and immediately started meeting with her key worker. Initially, she was unable to work or attend college, partly due to her illness, but with guidance and support, she started to grow in confidence and made steps towards her personal goals. Beccy says, "Before CHYP, my life was going nowhere". But now, three years later, she is moving forward in life, working, and living independently in her own flat.

### THE MILL DIARIES: # 2 – THE COTTAGES

For those who missed our initial piece in the March CHEQS Magazine, we are the lucky owners of Coln Mill and are hoping to restore it to its former flour-grinding glory! Given interest in the building and its prominence at the bottom of Coln, we thought it best to provide progress updates along the way.

Over the summer we completed a heritage assessment and bat surveys and have now submitted an initial planning application to renovate the former **millers' cottages**, which form the northern section of the mill building. The renovation has been designed to provide two small properties, while retaining and embracing historical features and bat interests - including a dedicated suite to accommodate a rare lesser horseshoe bat roost. We plan to rent these properties to provide some income to assist with the costs of running the mill, once it's restored. As part of this application, we will be re-landscaping the existing off-street car parking to ensure there is no additional parking pressure added to Coln's Main Street.

Next, we are turning our attention to the more challenging **mill** planning application. It should be possible to restore milling operations, and we hope that we can work with the heritage restrictions to allow some public access for exhibition and education purposes, as well as for small events. Unfortunately, running the properties from hydro power is prohibitively expensive with an approximate 500-year pay-back time, but we're hoping to do all we can to make the project as green as possible, including using water- and air-source pumps to heat both the mill and cottages.

If anyone has any local expertise that may be of use, or ideas for the final use of the mill, do let us know.



PROJECT

Harbour currently has 1,000 people registered with the project. When living on £39.63 per week, there is little to play around with. After the basics have been paid for, buying shower gel, shampoo and deodorant is not always an option. The Harbour Project has put together a

shopping list of items that are always needed for the Visitors - as it calls the people it helps:

- Toothbrush
- Toothpaste
- Shampoo
- Conditioner
- Shower Gel
- Deodorant
- Washing Up Liquid
- Washing Powder
- Cleaning Products

There will be a box in the church porch at Coln St Aldwyns, before and after the 4th Sunday service each month, to receive your products. You are also welcome to leave a bag of your washing/cleaning product donations (labelled 'Harbour Project'), at the back of Hatherop, Quenington or Coln churches, at any time. A big thank you to all who gave so generously last month. The Harbour Project was very grateful.

#### **Brief history of the Harbour Project**

In May 2000, when Kosovar Albanian refugees fled the fighting in former Yugoslavia, the Harbour Project was founded in Swindon, with funds from the Baptist Church, and help from other churches and local groups. The Harbour's focus was on providing friendship, free refreshments and emergency help with food and clothing. It also gave basic advice and signposted people to appropriate agencies.

Over the years, the Project has grown and developed, and adapted to the needs of whatever groups of people are arriving at the time (including the recent Ukrainian refuges), and always kept the needs of the Visitors at its heart. Although supported by various faith and political groups, it remains an independent, non-political and non-religious organisation. For more information visit <u>harbourproject.org.uk</u>.



## AUTOSPEEDWATCH



Driving into Quenington, you may have spotted the new signs alongside the "Welcome to Quenington" signposts. Erected by Gloucestershire Constabulary, the signs are located at the six entry points to the village, and alert drivers to the operation of **AutoSpeedWatch**, the new Community Speed Detecting Cameras within the village.

AutoSpeedWatch records the details of vehicles travelling in excess of the speed limit, along with the date, time and speed of the vehicle. No personal data is involved. Recorded information about vehicles is passed to the constabulary, who then decide what action, if any, to take. This information cannot be used to pursue a prosecution. Quenington Parish Council aims to use AutoSpeedWatch to encourage behaviour change through increased awareness and education, and thereby increase road safety within the village.

Quenington's AutoSpeedWatch cameras were initially installed in the village in September, and a 6-week validating period followed, during which vehicle speed data was gathered at each camera location. A summary of the findings from the three operational cameras, between 8th Sept – 14th Oct found that:

- 737 vehicles were recorded at or exceeding 36 mph, accounting for 1014 incidences of speeding
- Of the 737 vehicles, 73 accounted for the highest speeds, of 45-66mph!
- The most prolific offender was caught 13 times
- 28 illegal vehicles (those without tax or MOT) were identified

Quenington Parish Council is the first PC in Gloucestershire to be granted licences to install this system, which has now moved into the next phase.
