I live at 2 Vine Cottages, Southrop, next door to the Village Hall. I bought the house in April 1986, and until I retired, the house was used as a holiday and weekend

home by me, my parents, and my sister and her family. The village became important to our family: my brother's first child was christened here, my sister was married here, and our parents' ashes are in the churchyard.

I was the senior partner in an old-established firm of traditional family solicitors with offices in Willesden and West Ealing, London, and I was persuaded to buy a weekend place by an old client and friend, an amazing woman who escaped from the Warsaw Ghetto with her sister, for whom she had acquired a false passport. Having arrived in Vichy France with nothing, she qualified as a dentist, and came to London after the war. She bought Netherton Lodge, one of the former lodges of Hatherop Castle, and decided that I ought to buy something similar - she loved organising people.

Southrop has changed a lot since 1986. Then, Mrs Molly Richardson, the widow of Capt. Richardson who bought the Southrop Estate in the '20s, was still living here, and her daughter and son-in-law lived in the Manor. Wadham Close, The Farriers and Dawes Close had not yet been built, and at one point the school was almost closed down. Airbnb did not exist, and there were hardly any weekenders here.

My parents gave me a love of music and theatre, and I probably caught the railway bug, both models and the real thing, from my father. Until Covid happened, I was very involved in amateur theatre, having been a member of The Questors theatre company in Ealing since 1977. Founded in 1929, it is one of the largest amateur theatre groups in Europe. We run one of the largest Youth Theatres in the UK, and



have performed many times at the Edinburgh Fringe, and the Minack Open Air Theatre in Cornwall, and I was part of the Coarse Acting Show at the Shaftesbury Theatre in London, which was visited by the then Prince of Wales, who later visited our permanent theatre in Ealing, the Judi Dench Playhouse.

I was in Southrop for the weekend before lockdown happened in March 2020, and could see no point in going back to West London. Lockdown was difficult for everyone, but here I was able to see my garden through all four seasons and, when lockdown eased up a bit, make a few new friends and get more involved in village activities. ...important work which started over 50 years ago

John Allan, Development Director, Eastern Thames & Severn, writes:

The Cotswold Canals Trust was formed in 1972 to restore the 36 miles of the Stroudwater Navigation and the Thames & Severn Canal which, together, ran from Saul to Inglesham. Two substantial National Lottery grants have unlocked funding of over £50 million to enable restoration of 10 miles through Stroud to Saul. The large local population supports restoration as a means of regenerating what had become a dilapidated ribbon through the town and which has attracted a large volunteer base.

With restoration well advanced on the western sections, the time has come to develop plans and assemble resources to similarly restore the 10-mile eastern section from South Cerney to the Thames at Inglesham.

Most of the historic route is still visible requiring dredging and repair, but a ³/₄ mile section in Latton was destroyed when the A419 bypass was built and will need to be re-dug. Elsewhere all of the original highway bridges have been lost and apart from one at South Cerney rebuilt in 2003, will need replacing – all seven of them.

Successful restoration of the canal is dependent upon three critical areas all coming together in partnership:

To help make restoration happen... we are getting support of Local Authorities, National Agencies, Trusts and local businesses.

To allow restoration to happen... we are asking land-owners to give access permission and help with land acquisition or leases.

To undertake the restoration... we need volunteers – lots of them. There are many volunteering opportunities where you can help by bringing existing skills and expertise, or you can help whilst learning new skills from our many experts.

CIRENCESTER FOODBANK - A THANK YOU

Christian Walker writes: During the Harvest Festival services, the churches and both village schools contributed over 32 bags of food to the local Foodbank in Cirencester. Then, over the Christmas period, through the CHQ church services, people kindly supported by giving £1,089. In addition to this there was a further collection in Coln Stores providing festive food and supplies. This is an amazing amount of money and support for people and families in our area who going through hardship in difficult economic times.



The Foodbank doesn't think anyone in our communities should have to face going hungry. That's why they provide nutritionally-balanced emergency food and additional support to local people who are formally referred to the services. Foodbank clients bring their voucher to a Foodbank centre where it can be redeemed for three days-worth of emergency food. Volunteers meet clients over a warm drink or free hot meal and are able to signpost people to agencies who can help solve the longer-term problem – the Foodbank is typically a one-off support service, until other agencies step in. HOW TO BOOST YOUR STATE PENSION AND ACCESS THE HOUSEHOLD SUPPORT FUND

Do you know someone on a state pension who struggles to make ends meet? Or perhaps a couple? What if they could get a boost to their income? Too good to be true? A lot of people think so - a third of those who are eligible miss out.

This pension boost is called 'Pension Credit'. It not only provides extra pension income: it can also cover or reduce a host of other costs – rent, mortgage payments, council tax, energy and utilities, TV licence, dentists and opticians and more. Overall, the effects really can be transformative to pensioners who are struggling.

How to qualify? State pensioner households may be eligible if their income is less than £182.60 per week for single people, and less than £278.80 for couples. Pensioner households with a higher income may be eligible in some circumstances – for instance, if there is a carer in the household or someone with a disability.

So, do you know someone who may qualify? To find out more, search for Pension Credit online, ring the Pension Helpline **0800 99 1234** (8am - 5pm, Monday to

Friday), or get in touch with us at Citizens Advice Stroud and Cotswolds **0808 800 0510** (10am – 4pm Monday to Thursday, 10am – 1pm Friday) where we can check if you are claiming all the benefits you are entitled to. Don't hesitate – Pension Credit can make a big difference.

Pension Credit may also help you to access the **Household Support Fund** for help with food, energy costs and wider essentials such as warm clothes, bedding, boiler repairs and the purchase of white goods. Citizens Advice Stroud and Cotswold Districts currently has funding from Cotswold District Council to help pensioners on Pension Credit, or who are on a low income and struggling to make ends meet. 




