

I'm delighted to have been asked to introduce myself in this edition of CHEQS. I'm an Essex girl who has lived in Eastleach with my husband Sam for the last 28 years. At Eastleach Downs Organic Farm we grow cereals, and farm free-range pigs - organically, of course. Areas of the farm are protected in environmental schemes preserving wildlife habitat. We've brought up two daughters in this beautiful landscape too!

A few weeks ago, we were at the Oxford REAL Farming Conference, attending various talks on the climate crisis, and hearing about what we as farmers can do to protect the planet for future generations. We all need to do our bit and although we can't do everything, we can all do something. We've been recycling at the farm and at home for many years but, armed with the shocking statistic that only 15% of the plastic we *think* we recycle is actually re-used, we've set ourselves the ambitious target of eliminating single-use plastic from our lives.

I also chair our Village Hall Committee and have been overwhelmed by the support and generosity of the residents of Eastleach in the challenge to refurbish our lovely playground, and this year the hall itself. Watch this space for further progress reports!

EATING OUT IN CHEQS - THE VICTORIA INN, EASTLEACH

Over forthcoming issues, CHEQS Magazine will take a closer look at the people who run our local pubs/restaurants - starting with Thomas & Maya Gabbitas.



The Victoria Inn is a traditional Cotswold village pub, set on a rise overlooking the beautiful village of Eastleach. It was built as a private dwelling in the early 1700s and registered as a public house in the mid-1800s. Arkell's Brewery took it over from Courage in 1975. The customers are mostly locals during the week, with the addition of walkers, city folk and families at the weekends. The new terrace is a great place to eat outside in good weather.

Thomas & Maya started out in the restaurants, cafes and pubs of Bristol before moving to Eastleach seven years ago. They have been running The Victoria Inn for the last three years. Maya is in charge of looking after the accounts and HR, while Tom runs the 'front of house', with a great team led by Eppie, Zoe & Jed. They are fortunate to have long-serving, loyal staff from the village and surrounding areas. The kitchen is run by head chef Malcolm, ably assisted by Ashley. They like to keep the fare relatively simple and traditional, aiming at a timeless and classic ambience and menu, rather than anything too modern. The food is basically British, but influenced by classic French, Italian and Spanish cuisines, alongside the great pub classics.

The Victoria Inn also hosts an amazing slide blues guitarist, Will Killeen, every couple of months - as well as other live music throughout the year.



ST VALENTINE'S DAY

The romanticism surrounding St Valentine's Day can be fun. However, it can also make it a difficult time for some people. But what are the origins of the day?



Hazy history: There is some argument amongst scholars about the exact identity of the man after whom St Valentine's Day was named, but it seems that one candidate was a priest or a bishop in the Roman Empire who helped persecuted Christians. He was killed because of his faith on February 14th AD 269, but a feast day in his honour was not established until over 200 years later.

Invented ideas: It is thought that many of the current legends about Saint Valentine were invented in the 14th century in England, notably by Geoffrey Chaucer and his circle, when the feast day first seems to have become associated with romantic love.

Biblical basis: As part of the wedding ceremony, many couples choose a Bible reading from part of Paul's first letter to the Corinthian Church. This was not written about romantic love - but of selfless, godly love to be shown by each person to another. It is a great ideal, and gives us something to aim at in all our relationships - with friends, family, neighbours, acquaintances or strangers.

It does not dishonour others, it is not self-seeking,
it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs.


