

## FROM THE VICAR

As many of you know, a couple of weeks ago I shared with church-members the news that I shall be retiring as Team Vicar, and moving away, at the end of September this year.

It wasn't an easy decision. There's so much to keep me here – not least the friendliness of you all, and of course the enjoyment of living in this lovely place and helping the various village churches (six under my supervision at the latest count) to flourish.

However, I was ordained almost forty years ago; and so I'm one of the few clergy in the Church of England who will have earned my whole pension before the date that I'm able to start drawing it. Clergy retirement age is now 68, but I shall in fact have earned my full pension this summer. In effect I shall be having a huge pay-cut then, and so some time ago I agreed with the Diocese that I'd give up my salary this year (it's not worth so much from this August) so that someone else in the Team could have it – we'd appoint another full-timer to solve our staffing shortage. At that point I'd either continue to work, on an unpaid basis (dropping my parishes south of the A417), or I'd retire fully and move away.

In fact what I've decided to do is to retire fully. I've a huge range of things that I enjoy doing that I'd like to be able to do while I'm still relatively young and fit; and retired clergy are so useful in the Church of England (think of Roger & Margaret and others in our CHEQS villages) that I shall be glad to be one of them. So in the autumn Liz and I will bid our farewells and move to Charlbury, north of Oxford, where we bought a house last year.

What that will mean for CHQ is something that will be discussed over the coming months, and we shall keep you fully informed in this magazine. There won't be an interregnum as such – that's the benefit of being part of a Team – and in the immediate aftermath of my leaving Roger Scoones and Margaret Bettis will pick up much of the Sunday and other ministry, together with our growing team of lay worship leaders and the pastoral team, and they'll be overseen by Tim Hastie-Smith (Team Vicar of Bibury)... pending a longer-term arrangement.

I'm still here for the next eight or nine months, and I've no intention of working less hard during that time. So let's look forward to some good things together in the coming months!

## **HATHEROP CASTLE SCHOOL**

*Nigel Bailey, Director of Sport, writes:*

### **The Best Start in Life - physical activity in the early years**

Being active regularly is good for all of us, but for children under the age of five it can be vital to their future health and wellbeing. Over 90% of children aged 2-4 are currently not meeting the UK physical activity guidelines for their age group of three hours of activity a day. This means that they are missing opportunities to positively benefit their health and establish a healthy lifestyle that carries on into adulthood.

#### **Children under five who are not yet walking**

Physical activity is any movement at this age. Examples are:

- floor-based play in different positions - this could include 'tummy time', rolling, or reaching for toys
- water-based activities

#### **Children under five who are walking by themselves**

Your child should be active for a total of at least 180 minutes (three hours) a day. This does not have to be all at once so their physical activity can be spread

throughout the day. Physical activity can be unstructured active play or structured exercise of varying intensities. Movement skills gained at this young age set the scene for movement skills such as balance and co-ordination when they're older.

Being physically active at a young age is proven to support brain development, enhance bone health and muscular development, as well as having non-physical benefits to social and cognitive skills development and emotional wellbeing.

As Director of Sport at Hatherop Castle School, I regularly see the benefits that sport and exercise can have on young children. Part of my job allows me to teach Physical Development (PD) in the Nursery once a week, during which time the children have an opportunity to experience a variety of games and activities. Most of the activities taught allow the children to explore the use of equipment and become active learners and have the opportunity to show their creativity. The skills learnt at this age are then developed throughout Nursery and into Reception. As the time allocation for sport increases as the children move up the school, it means the children are able to perform a host of new skills.

From experience, children must be fully engaged and enjoy what they are doing, otherwise they lose interest. If children have the opportunity to run and play, in time they will start to show interest in various activities. With lots of reinforcement and continuous praise, all children can achieve and be rewarded with the benefits that a healthy lifestyle can bring to us all.

However, the main highlight of this term will be our Community Tea Event on February 12<sup>th</sup> when the children will spend the day cooking and preparing a wonderful teatime spread of scones and cake. It is a lovely opportunity for the schoolchildren to give back to the community.

## CANDLEMAS

**Candlemas** also known as the **Feast of the Presentation of Our Lord Jesus** and the **Feast of the Purification of the Blessed Virgin Mary**, commemorates the presentation of Jesus at the Temple. It is based upon the account of the presentation of Jesus in Luke 2:22–40. It falls on February 2, which is traditionally the 40th day of the Christmas season. While it is customary for Christians in some countries to remove their Christmas decorations on Twelfth Night those in other Christian countries historically remove them on Candlemas. On Candlemas, many Christians bring their candles to their local church, where they are blessed and then used for the rest of the year; for Christians, these candles serve as a symbol of Jesus Christ, who referred to himself as the Light of the World.

**Tony Scotland writer, publisher & broadcaster talks about his latest book**

*Joyride: To a Reunion at Kardamyli* is the story of an eccentric pilgrimage.
